Major tram stops set for an upgrade

Two of Southbank's most prominent tram stops will be upgraded as part of Public Transport Victoria's (PTV) Route 96 project.

While the plan is still at the consultation stage, major changes have been mooted for Stop 124 – World Trade Centre (city-side of the river) and Stop 125 – Port Junction (Whiteman St).

Both stops have been identified as needing better access for disabled passengers and will become Centre Island Platform Stops.

Under the plan, Stop 124 will stay in its current location and a central island will be incorporated to allow better and safer access.

The changes are designed to cater for more passengers, while maintaining the stop's connectivity to walking and bicycle paths through Batman Park.

Stop 125's changes are more complicated. It will also be upgraded to a Central Island Platform Stop, but will have a third platform added.

The Melbourne Tramcar Restaurant will have its own track and platform and Route 112 will be separated from Routes 96 and 109. The report also recommends removing Stop 124b, which sees the trams stop on Spencer St, before turning into Whiteman St.

The changes to Stop 125 would happen in three stages.

A spokesperson from PTV told Southbank

Local News that the changes were part of the State Government's \$800 million tram upgrade program.

"The project aims to improve the reliability of this busy tram route and provide level access stops along the length of Route 96 to ensure it is accessible to all people at all times," the spokesperson said.

"To meet these objectives, the Route 96 Project Team has developed concept designs which provide priority for trams and focus on moving more people, more efficiently."

The spokesperson also pointed out that these plans were still very much at a consultative

stage and more feedback was encouraged.

"As part of the project, PTV is currently seeking feedback on the proposed concept design for Stop 124 – World Trade Centre and Stop 125 Port Junction tram interchange," the spokesperson explained.

"It is important to note these are only draft proposals. PTV has had a fantastic response to community consulation so far, with more than 600 submissions received."

The suburb is at a unique and important



Green light for new bike lane

St Kilda Rd will lose another lane of motor traffic to make way for a bike lane for cyclists travelling south, away from the CBD.

The City of Melbourne announced the new bike lane last month, two months after it added a bike lane to north-bound traffic across Princes Bridge.

While a tram stop prevents it from adding the south-bound lane on the bridge, it will run for 300 metres, from Alexander Gardens down to the floral clock.

Councillor Cathy Oke said the council's major concern was the safety of everyone using St Kilda Rd.

"Anyone who has travelled along this stretch of road will know how hectic it can be with large numbers of motorists, cyclists, pedestrians and tram commuters all sharing the space," Cr Oke said.

"Cars and cyclists, in particular, travel incredibly close to each other," she added.

"Where road space permits, we are designing our bike lanes to separate cyclists from motorists."

Cr Oke also said the council wanted to encourage more cyclists to ride through the city.

"Just over 13 per cent of vehicles entering the city in the morning peak are bicycles, and this figure will only continue to grow."

The lane will take one lane of motor traffic out of the service lane. There will also be one metre of separation between cars and bicycles, a move to keep cyclists clear of opening car doors.

The council said the change would not create any "significant" travel delays.

Work on the lane started at the beginning of August and should be finished by mid-September.



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Candid candidates talk Southbank

As many lose faith in our two major political party's leaders, the federal election on September 7 may well be decided on the strength of local candidates. With that in mind, 'Southbank Local News' spoke to the three major party's candidates for the House of Representatives in Melbourne Ports.

Michael Danby (ALP)

Mr Danby said you won't hear him talk too glowingly about former Victorian Premier Jeff Kennett, but one thing he will say is that Mr Kennett's job of revitalising Southbank has been great for Melbourne. He pointed to the fantastic mix of commercial, residential and cultural centres in the area.

Mr Danby said the biggest issue facing Southbank in the next five years was managing development and population growth. Mr Danby said he had kept a close eye on the Southbank blueprint for the Arts Precinct and was confident it was being delivered responsibly.

He also said the growing number of families in Southbank put a school, childcare and maternal health facilities high on the agenda in the area.

"The Boyd Centre is a good start – but is already showing signs of strain. Local and State Governments need to identify and co-ordinate the needs for future growth in demand and start to plan now," Mr Danby explained.

Mr Danby said that, if re-elected, he would continue his campaign to implement the metro train tunnel, which includes a new underground station at the Domain interchange. He also said he'd be campaigning strongly to have the grand prix at Albert Park moved elsewhere.

Kevin Ekendahl (Liberal)

Mr Ekendahl is a Southbank resident and said, as such, he was very aware of how great it was to work and live here. He said that, despite Southbank being characterised by tall buildings, there was a great sense of community in the area and that every resident he has spoken to loved living here.

Mr Ekendahl listed schools, crime, facilities for our ageing population and development and traffic as Southbank's major issues. He said Southbank experienced a disproportionate amount of crime.

"Having measures in place that can detect and prevent crime, such as CCTV cameras and better lighting is essential," Mr Ekendahl said.

He also was concerned about health facilities for the ageing population of Soutbank, saying: "As more elderly people move into the area and current residents age, social isolation and accessing health facilities becomes an issue."

Mr Ekendahl said that, if elected, he would fight for current schools to have increased capacity to take in more students, as well as urging the State Government to speed up plans for a new school and plan for another.

He also wanted to develop a better relationship with the between State and Federal Governments to make sure locals

were listened to on planning issues.

Ann Birrell (Greens)

Ms Birrell said Southbank was a fabulous location, being tucked between the city, the river, parks and cultural centres. She said it had become one of the most livable suburbs in Melbourne, with open airy spaces like the promenade and around Malthouse.

Ms Birrell said inappropriate development, and the traffic congestion and loss of amenity that came along with it, was the biggest issue facing the area. She also said residents faced limited access to community facilities, schools, medical clinics, banks post office and community spaces and infrastructure that brought people together.

She also pointed out that Southbank was already being affected by flash flooding, as a result of climate change and the problem was only going to get worse.

"Locally, we need to upgrade drains, install water capture and storage projects and make Southbank's streetscapes more water sensitive," Ms Birrell explained.

Ms Birrell echoed Mr Danby's thoughts on the metro train tunnel, saying: "The eastwest link will not help Southbank, but the metro tunnel will provide more convenient and accessible public transport, which will get more cars off already congested roads."

"With federal funds for these projects in place, Southbank can transition to a much more liveable suburb," she added. There are three other candidates running in the Melbourne Ports electorate:

Steven Armstrong (Stable Population Party)

Terry Guthridge (Palmer United Australia)

Melissa Star (Australian Sex Party)

The federal election is on September 7. At the time of printing the polling booths close-by included Old Galilee school hall (Cr Montague and Bank St South Melbourne), Port Melbourne Primary School (415 Graham St) and Melbourne Town Hall (90-130 Swanston St).

Ski Lodge shines in winter



Growing Southbank Rotary, as well as nurturing the talents within the group were both high on the agenda for the incoming president.

"Over the last couple of years, we've become a younger group, with a sprinkling of experienced Rotarians. I want to develop a broad leadership group within the club."

A new president is not the only change at Rotary. Its weekly meetings have moved from its home at Crown to the refurbished Blue Train in Southgate.

"We've been at Crown for 14 years, since the club started, so there was an emotional connection there, but ultimately I think that relationship had run its race," Mr Shortt explained.

"We think holding our meetings at Blue Train puts us right in the heart of the action

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
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Litter hotspot partnerships

The Yarra River is due to benefit from a recent Victorian Government announcement for plans to establish a series of community litter hotspot partnerships.

The Litter Hotspots Project has been established to help clean up the Yarra River and Port Philip Bay.

Minister for Environment and Climate Change Ryan Smith said the new initiative would encourage community groups and councils to put forward plans on ways to reduce the amount of litter ending up in the bay.

Mr Smith said the plan would allow local communities to form direct partnerships with the State Government in a bid to encourage support for Melbourne's iconic waterways.

"Councils and community groups are encouraged to identify litter hot spots and submit project ideas for local responses to reduce the amount of litter ending up in our waterways," he said.

Mr Smith said the \$7 million plan is about attracting "local solutions", with an initial \$180,000 being allocated to support effective coordination and planning efforts with the community.

"We want local solutions to fix local hot spots. We know that many local residents and volunteers want to be involved as part of the solution in cleaning up our waterways – we want to help them to deliver these positive outcomes."

"The metro planning forum really showed

the passion of people living in the capital city zone. It showed people love living here, but also have legitimate concerns that governments at both levels need to start listening to," Mr Smolders said.

"It's been really pleasing to make good relationships with the new council team, both councillors and officers."

Mr Smolders said he was keen to maintain a role at the SRG and wanted to continue to help out where he could.

"It doesn't mean I'm not going to be involved, but the role of president specifically just needs someone who has the time available to them," Mr Smolders explained.

Green light on North Wharf

Planning Minister Matthew Guy last month approved plans for the \$90 million North Wharf redevelopment.

Just across the river, opposite the Melbourne Exhibition and Convention Centre, North Wharf's developer Asset 1 has been granted approval to construct a 13-storey office tower, upgrade part of the wharf and refurbish the existing Seafarers Rest park.

The development also includes plans to partially demolish and redevelop the heritage-listed Goods Shed no. 5, introducing retail, cafes, restaurants and an art gallery.

"This unique area of the city is one of the last Yarra River precincts to be redeveloped and presents a great opportunity to revive Melbourne's western cornerstone," Mr Guy said.

Asset 1 Chief Operating Officer Gavin Boyd said the start of construction was dependent on the commercial market.

An anchor tenant of between 10,000 and 12,000 sqm in is required to kick-start the development.

Work on Seafarers Rest Park and the Goods Shed will be concurrent with construction of the office tower.

Mr Boyd said it was expected to be at least a year before construction started.





Design comp complete ... but isn't there something missing?

With much fanfare, the State Government announced a winner of the Flinders St Station design competition last month, but there was one rather important detail missing.

The winning design, by HASSELL, Herzog and De Meuron, looks spectacular with large white tubes enclosing the stations platforms, but the Government is yet to allocate any funds towards the project.

\$1 million was spent on the competition, but the activation of the design may never actually go ahead.

To further prove the thirst for change at the iconic station, the people's choice award had a huge number of voters.

Almost 19,000 people voted on their favourite design. A design from University of Melbourne won the people's choice award.

The winning HASSELL, Herzog and De Meuron design came third in the people's choice award.

Victorian Premier Dennis Napthine said the winning proposal really opened up the station.

"The proposal offers tremendous benefits to

Victorians, connecting the city to the north with the river and Southbank, while, at the same time opening up views and access to the historic administration building," Mr Napthine said.

"The jury has praised the winning design for its respect to heritage of the administration building while creating new and memorable additions to the station, such as the vaulted train hall, the new gallery and riverside amphitheatre," he added.

Minster for Major Projects, David Hodgett, echoed the Premier's thoughts and hinted at the prospect of making the design a reality, without specifically saying the project would be eventually be funded.

"The jury praised the HASSELL, Herzog and De Meuron design for its 'evident sophistication and overall quality' going on to add that it 'could indeed provide a major city-changing outcome with benefits for all Victorians," Mr Hodgett said.

Jim Stynes bridge update

The first section of the Jim Stynes Bridge is likely to be delivered next month.

The \$18 million bridge, named in honour of the late footballer Jim Stynes, will provide a pedestrian and cycling link between Northbank and Docklands.

The bridge, which had been under construction since February, will extend beneath the Charles Grimes Bridge (Wurundjeri Way), with structure works well advanced, according to a City of Melbourne spokesperson.

"The fabrication of the structure is progessing well with the first module expected to be delivered to site by mid-August," the spokesperson said.

"The installation of all 14 modules is scheduled to be completed by the end of 2013 with the project estimated for completion by late March 2014."

Soup Kitchen keeps it ReaL

Local charity The Big Umbrella say it is not the action of providing a meal that inspires them to feed Melbourne's marginalized communities.

While a hot pancake or bowl of homemade soup might sound satisfying on its own merits, the charity believes a meal, without the added side of respect, isn't a meal at all.

Charity founder Justin Dickinson established the Flinders Street soup kitchen over two years ago on the premise of giving people a meal but more importantly their time of day.

Operating every Wednesday and Thursday, "A ReaL MeaL" soup kitchen has since served close to 10,000 hot meals to more than 200 people a night.

Director of "A ReaL MeaL" Michael Carlyon said the program was about building a community feel for volunteers and those they support.

"We differentiate ourselves from other food van services," he said. "Spending that length of time, getting to know people, offering the conversation is what it's about for us."

"They have fallen in love with us and we have fallen in love with them, we always look to support them in every way possible."

The Big Umbrella and "A ReaL MeaL" originally began in Nepal after Mr Dickinson spent three years volunteering and filming free documentaries for charities in third world countries.



While in Nepal he became exposed to some 6000 to 8000 children calling the streets of Kathmandu their home, which compelled him into action both at home and abroad.

Today, The Big Umbrella supports NGO's and communities in Nepal and Vietnam on projects aimed at fighting hunger, homelessness, slave labour and human trafficking.

Partnerships with the Father Bob Maguire

Foundation and Front Yard City Mission have seen "A ReaL MeaL" extend to youth outreach and education programs as well as skills training for the homeless community.

Mr Carlyon said the charity is determined to help eradicate the next generation of homelessness in Melbourne.

The Australian lunch break ... disappearing

Australians are skipping lunch, eating at their desks and catching up on personal admin in ever-increasing numbers, according to research conducted by ING Direct. The disappearing lunch break comes as Australians admit that work and personal demands are eating into their lunch breaks.

Almost one in three of us (28 per cent) are eating at our desk; a similar proportion (33 per cent), are skipping lunch entirely once a week and one in 10 usually work through their lunch break.

I miss 'Game Of Thrones' too

In the business of television, there have always been copycats.

Once there's a winning formula, a surefire hit that everybody's talking about, it's naturally only a matter of time before some half-baked imposter shows up on the TV Guide. This may not come as a shock, with all of the singing, cooking, home-renovating goodness that's been littering our screens (and this column) lately, the concept is not an unfamiliar one.

We're used to seeing more of the same but, this time though, it's not some reality show clone where the teaser is some underwhelming "twist" on the already over-exploited and uninteresting format. It's not a crime show of any kind. It's not even a medical show. It's a show about swords and men with beards. And sex.

Vikings is a TV series commissioned by Canada's History Channel. It follows the exploits of real-life historical figure Ragnar Lodbrok, a Viking folklore legend who, up until now, I have never heard of.

Ragnar and his merry band of Vikings

carry out the adventurous and plunder-rife lives that are depicted in the stories you've already heard of. They plunder, steal, murder and rape their way across what is now called Greenland in an attempt to gather fortune and glory.

Vikings attempts to tell the human stories of such people, as they struggle against the elements (and each other) and live deeply ritualistic and traditional lives befitting their renown.

The cast is very good, especially Travis
Fimmel as Ragnar Lodbrok, who is a clear
standout, and many of the main actors carry
a sort of Scandanavian accent, to lend some
kind of authenticity to the dialogue, except
Gabriel Byrne who plays the township's
ruler. Byrne's use of a Victorian English
accent, is quite mismatched, and undoes the
convincing nature of his performance.

Adding to that, this series is built on the idea it is meant to follow historic events, considering its main character is a reallife historical figure. However, experts are

already speaking out about certain flaws in the historical accuracy of the show, which to me makes the whole thing kind of redundant

Joining me, and most of you, the former Prime Minister Julia Gillard is also a devoted fan of the HBO adapted *Game of Thrones* (*GoT*) series which is clearly the inspiration for *Vikings'* production.

Despite the fact that it doesn't air on

terrestrial television, the devoted fan base of people addicted to it, manage to find it online. Despite the fact that *Vikings* is clearly trading on the flavour of the week, it is a poor substitute when compared to *GoT*.

Had I not been addicted to the latter, I could call myself a fan of *Vikings* but as with many programs that crop up as part of a trend, it pales in comparison to the material it was inspired from.





The Flinders Street Station redevelopment competition has closed and the winners have been announced. Perhaps you took the time to view the six finalists' work displayed on the station forecourt or online?

We were particularly interested in the competition because any development of the station will have a major impact on the future operation of the river.

Some of the designs were undoubtedly grandiose dreams and it was remarked that a couple of them looked more suitable for Dubai. I think that everyone would agree that the chosen design needs to retain the beauty and integrity of the magnificent 1890s edifice.

A couple of the designs grasped the potential for integrating the station with the river. They incorporate major berthing facilities for river boats, cascading tiers from the station to the water's edge, great integration of Flinders and Elizabeth streets with the river, and even a roof-top garden to help break-up the concrete and asphalt of the inner city. It's encouraging to see one of the station designs recognise this huge potential for multimodal public transport.

For more than a decade the Yarra River Business Association (YRBA) has been strongly advocating for a major improvement to the shameful pedestrian underpass between Elizabeth St and Northbank, as well as for a suitable use for the beautiful and historic Banana Alley Vaults.

The Premier's design competition for the station precinct eventually embraced both those elements (thanks largely to the intervention of Lord Mayor Robert Doyle) and we are hoping that, at the very least, we'll see major improvement to the amenity of the underpass.

It has required constant lobbying to even get the white tiles of the walkway steam cleaned. Previously the Department of Transport had said that the heritage value of the tiles meant that they couldn't be adequately cleaned. It was only when Transport Minister Terry

Mulder inspected the facility soon after the last state election and declared the subway as a putrid and unsafe entrance to Southbank, that the department acted, and there was a slight improvement to the appearance.

However, before we get too excited, as reported earlier in the paper, the competition is only a competition. No government commitment has been made to upgrading Flinders Street Station, let alone any money.

Remember that it took more than 50 years of design competitions for a Melbourne landmark before Jeff Kennett bit the bullet and commissioned Federation Square. Love it or hate it, Fed Square is an internationallyrecognised piece of architecture and, in its short 10 years, it has created a new heart and meeting place for Melburnians.

It cost \$470 million - \$350 million more than estimated - but it has been a huge legacy project, which will be enjoyed by Victorians and visitors for the next century. Amortised over 100 years it will represent very good value.

So, Dr Napthine, please view the Flinders Street Station project in terms of what it could do to enhance the liveability of Melbourne during the next century.

While on the subject of legacy projects and Federation Square, Fed Square's longserving CEO, Kate Brennan, steps down from the role next month after eight years.

Our precinct will be the poorer for losing someone with such vision, enthusiasm and commitment to the community. Maybe Kate could head-up a new authority to oversee the visionary redevelopment of Flinders Street Station!

International student hospitality and friendship at St John's Southgate

For a number of years now, St John's Southgate Lutheran Church, in conjunction with local Lutheran tertiary students, has been hosting a free "Student Meals" program on Tuesday nights, from 6.30 - 8pm during university semesters.

The program aims to provide hospitality and friendship to international students studying in Melbourne, as well as a chance for international students to practise their English conversation skills in a relaxed, informal environment with local Aussies.

Some of the international students who have attended have commented that Student Meals feels like their family away from home and that the weekly meal is one of the highlights of their week. The meals have a mini-United Nations feel, with people from up to 17 different countries, relaxing, sharing food, and building friendships.

We have welcomed students from countries as diverse as Brazil, the USA, France, China, Malaysia, Taiwan, Japan, Germany, Russia, Singapore, Argentina and others.

Last semester things took on a fun twist with Student Meals organiser, Sonia Gellert, sharing her musical experience and teaching well-known English songs to the international students. This culminated in a bit of a dance party at the end of the semester!

Student Meals program organisers also try to arrange a couple of outings each semester, including such opportunities as trips to the Healesville Sanctuary or to a game of Aussie Rules.

Funding and most of the volunteers for the Student Meals are both provided by Lutheran Students and Friends (LSF), a group of Christian young adults,

including tertiary students and young workers. LSF also organises a Christian worship service for students and young adults on Sunday evenings at 6pm at St John's, and mid-week bible studies in and around the CBD for those who are interested. However, it must be stressed that Student Meals are open to all students, of all ethnic and religious backgrounds, simply offered by LSF as an act of hospitality and service to the community, with no expectation to join in any Christian events.

There are a number of volunteers who share the load of cooking, sharpening their culinary skills by providing a (usually) threecourse meal with soup, main course and dessert, always including a vegan/vegetarian option for those who require it.

There are other volunteers who come to help set up tables, eat, talk with internationals and do some of the dishes afterwards.

One of the great joys has been a real sense of community as people have returned a number of times and have got to know one another, building lasting friendships across cultures.

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Dodds St


Travelling south through Southbank Village is Dodds St, which was named after Henry Dodds.

Dodds migrated to Victoria from Scotland in 1852 as a 20-year-old. He came for the promise of riches and for many years dug for gold at Forrest Creek, while running a store in Ballarat.

When he moved back to Melbourne he joined Robison Bros and Co. to create Robison Bros and Dodds, a long-standing foundry on the southern bank of the Yarra River.

In 1888 the partnership was amalgamated with the Albion foundry (the chairman of the new firm was Alfred Deakin).

Dodds moved from business into public service, becoming a councillor in 1892 and Mayor of Emerald Hill in 1884 for two years. During his twilight years, he also became vice-president of the newly-formed South Melbourne Football Club.

Ms Kuvei said the Southgate Roop Rani had found a great balance between the high-end beauty treatments it's always offered and everyday treatments.


"We have got the facials and the pampering treatments, but we also do waxing, threading and haircuts – the day-to-day stuff," Ms Kuvei
